100state is moving to a new downtown location

100state, Wisconsin's largest co-working organization and a

major hub for entrepreneurial and freelance activity, is moving to a new location in downtown Madison.

The news was made public when Neil Heinen, the editorial director of WISC-TV and Madison Magazine, shared a clip from the next episode of his Sunday news show "For the Record" on his Facebook page. In the clip, 100state director Gregory St. Fort, sitting with other members of the organization's leadership team, confirmed the news.

The new space is located in the AT&T Building on 316 W. Washington Ave. It's a space that houses a number of growing companies in the tech sector, including Filament Games, Catalyze, EatStreet, and UnderStory. Its first floor is also occupied by Red Dine Lounge, which just moved to the location from King Street.

100state's membership includes a number of emerging startups of its own, including the fashion app Markable.

"It's going to be a great opportunity," said St. Fort in the "For the Record" clip. "(There's) a lot going on in that building."

The space is moving from the sixth floor of 30 West Mifflin St., an office building on the Capitol Square. Previously, it had occupied spaces at its namesake of 100 State St., as well as in a train car near the West Washington Ave. train depot.

100state's team has said that the reason for the move would be to accommodate its growing membership -- which numbers in the hundreds -- in a space that's larger, with more office space and amenities.
